THE DEATH OF MISS JEAN GUNN.

My Dear Colleagues,—

It is my sad duty to inform you of the passing, on June 28th, 1941, of Miss Jean Gunn, one of the very dear members and whilom officers of the International Council of Nurses.

Few of our members have occupied so deep a place in the hearts of International Nurses as Jean Gunn, and she died as she had lived, in harmony and in peace with God and the world she so dearly loved. During her long illness she suffered a great deal of pain, but her spirit and her courage inspired all who had the opportunity to be with her.

It is with a keen sense of loss that we record our sorrow and place Miss Gunn's name among those to be remembered always as outstanding figures in International Nursing.

MEMORANDUM FROM THE PRESIDENT.
Appointment of Third Vice-President.

According to the By-Laws of the Council, "in the event of a vacancy in the office of the first Vice-President . . . her duties shall be assumed by the second Vice-President. In the event of a vacancy in the office of the second Vice-President . . . her duties shall be assumed by the third Vice-President until the next meeting of the Board of Directors."

Accordingly, Miss B. Alexander of South Africa becomes first Vice-President and Mile. de Joannis of France the second Vice-President of the Council.

In order that the President may have an officer in close proximity in the event that urgent decisions must be made, I trust I may have your approval in appointing Miss Grace M. Fairley, now President of the Canadian Nurses' Association, to be the third Vice-President of our organisation until the next meeting of the Board of Directors. Under existing circumstances the President is the only elected officer on this side of the Atlantic, and occasions may arise when prompt action will be essential for the welfare of the Council.

Miss Fairley attended the last meeting of the Board of Directors in London in 1939 and by long association with the I.C.N. is familiar with its functions so that her assistance will be valuable.
