NIGHTINGALEIANA.

We have to thank Miss Mary M. Roberts, R.N., Editor of the *American Journal of Nursing*, for one of her very kind letters, in which she encloses "The Order of Service" held annually at the Cathedral of Saint John The Divine "In the Memory of Florence Nightingale and the Nurses who have died in Service." Over 1,000 student nurses in uniform attended the Service this year. Graduate nurses in the uniforms of their schools, or of the American Red Cross Nursing Service, or public health associations, were also in attendance.

This Nurses' Service was originally instituted by St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, on May 17th, 1925. It is now held under the auspices of the New York League of Nursing Education, and the New York County Registered Nurses' Association. Miss Roberts writes many inspiring words far too appreciative for publication. Her reason for sending the programme of the Service is "to give you this bit of assurance that, on this side of the Atlantic, we are striving towards the ideals of Miss Nightingale."

TRAINING OF WOMEN IN TROPICAL NURSING.

Lord Moyne, Secretary of State for the Colonies, presiding at the annual Court of Governors of the Seamen's Hospital Society, stated that he and the Colonial Governments, as well as other Ministers and public and private bodies, were interested in the treatment and investigation of tropical diseases and the teaching of tropical medicine.

It is proposed to develop, as soon as conditions permit, a comprehensive scheme which will include adequate facilities in London for the study of tropical medicine and for carrying out clinical research and training, including the training of women in tropical nursing.
