form a committee to consider nursing conditions, and present a report.

When agreed, this report should be available for consideration by the General Nursing Councils, the Ministries of Health, English and Scottish Chairmen of Hospital Committees, and Members of Parliament.

### SPRING NETTLES.

#### To the Editor of THE BRITISH JOURNAL OF NURSING.

MADAM,—At this moment there is a great shortage of spring greens throughout the country. Spring greens are essential to ward off those early forms of disease which show themselves in skin eruptions and other pre-scurvy warnings.

Our great-grandmothers told us, and I would remind you of their teaching, that until garden greens appear, we may go to the hedges and rubbish heaps where nettle tops are everywhere to be found.

Take a pair of scissors in a gloved hand, and cut off the young nettle tops. Throw them into a bucket of cold water, stir them round with a stick, and then put them wet as they are, with no other water, into a saucepan, put on the lid, and cook quickly.

This will give a delightful tender dish almost equal to spinach, and if beaten up with a little milk or fat will provide a dish not only tasty and tender, but valuable to ward off spring anæmias and post-winter ailments.

# THE MIDWIFE.

A correspondent writes as follows in Una on "Midwifery Training."

#### MIDWIFERY TRAINING.

I believe midwifery training is the most important of any and regard it as of national and spiritual as well as of professional importance. The type required for such should be of particularly clean hands, pure hearts and clear minds, such as will influence for good, young mothers. The blameless, defenceless little new life should receive the aseptic touch on reaching this plane, indeed more so than articles required in the nursing.

Mental troubles often could be prevented in later life if midwifery experts were of first-class order, knew the full meaning of their responsibility and so the foundation of at least some mental ills would be prevented. Prevention is better than cure. There are various reasons for mental ills, various ignorances perhaps, not only of the afflicted themselves but those who are responsible, to know and to act for their welfare, even of husbands, parents, etc., who may shirk responsibility or in circumstances which place unavoidable strain.

Start of Life is most important and the duty of those guiding the early life should be gifted and fully awake to their duty, really spiritual guardians who impart knowledge wisely. Even after childbirth the young mother expects guidance and rightly too. Babes should be received into the hands of such guardians of Life. So few realise fully the sacredness of this work and perhaps they use what could be a gift for national improvement as a means to accumulate money or excel in professional skill. They serve Ambition and so this extra certificate is misused.

Warfare experience calls for many unexpected incidents in obstetrical and surgical nursing and asepsis is required in every emergency.

Christ sanctified poverty with His humble birth ages ago, but in our present state of intelligence this could not be continued in a huge population. The strictest asepsis must be carried out by the best type of doctor and nurse. Enlightened gifted souls whose ideals are of the highest order should give the guidance necessary for the mother and her babe. Each individual then could or should be her own mental nurse thinking aright and following the laws of life sanely.

Hitler's powerful Germany was started in its cradles, the proper care of mothers and infants was encouraged. The new world of to-morrow must be enlightened as well as powerful. This is the world of which our Princess Elizabeth spoke in her recent broadcast to the Nation and it will start from our cradles. The protective dominating influences that surround them will be the most intelligent as important as education or professional skill. Ideals are above money or ambition, those who work for spiritual progress are indeed in the service of sacrifice.

I believe the midwifery nurse with the necessary knowledge and power holds a trust from our Saviour and Friend for little children, to bring about such a world of to-morrow, to exercise a calling to service for Humanity, for future Peace, for the protection of innocent Motherhood and the little children in our homeland. She can guard and guide our futre generations through spiritual understanding.

Many comforting arrangements are being made all over the country for mothers-to-be. The Princess Royal recently visited Farnley Hall, the home of Major Horton Fawkes, which has been converted for use as a maternity home under the West Riding County Council. Her Royal Highness spoke to each of the 23 patients, and also visited the nursery, where there were nine babies, who we hope are all flourishing.
