### Editorial.

HE Report of the Select Committee of the House of Lords marks an epoch 6 in the history of English Nursing. Not only is it the first Parliamentary

expression of opinion, which, so far as we are aware, has ever been given upon Nursing matters, but the views which are enunciated are most momentous. The main conclusions at which their lordships have arrived, pivot in the most remarkable way upon the evidence given, concerning the Nursing Departments of two great London Hospitals. Like the description of an ancient battle, in which the conflict seems to have centered around one or two redoubtable champions in either camp, so in this case, although the arrangements at many Institutions were inquired into, the interest is concentrated upon those in force at the London Hospital on the one side, and at St. Bartholomew's on the other. And we cannot but rejoice that the field has been so circumscribed, because, while there can be no dispute that Nursing Reforms are urgently needed in many Hospitals, no good and much harm could be caused by forcibly attracting public attention to these Institutions severally. It will be within the memory of our readers that, in the summer of 1890, Miss YATMAN, Miss DICKINSON, and other ladies who had been
