Manual of Strathpeffer Spa (Mr. Lewis Munro, Dingwall). Price Sixpence. Strathpeffer, in the County of Rossshire, deserves to be more widely known, not on account only of its grand situation and scenery, but also for the valuable properties of its waters, of which there are two distinct kinds, the sulphurous and the chalybeate. In what is known as the "New" or "Strong" Well there are over thirty grains of sulphur to the imperial gallon, while at Harrogate and Moffat there are only eight grains and twothirds grain respectively. The waters are particularly recommended in cases of rheumatism, gout, and affections of the kidneys. Mr. Munro has compiled his little work very carefully, and gives much interesting information respecting the Spa and its neighbourhood.

Stammering: Its Nature and Treatment, by EMIL BEHINKE. (M. T. Fisher Unwin, Paternoster Square, E.C.) Mr. BEHINKE, whose work in the domain of vocal physiology is not unknown, has here given us a thoroughly practical little treatise on this distressing malady. He has evidently made an exhaustive study of it, both in its practical and theoretical aspects. There are some few warnings and pieces of advice which should be taken to heart, especially by those who have charge of children. For instance, he denies that the difficulty is wholly elocutionary, but that, on the other hand, there is frequently some physical defect which requires treatment by surgeon or physician, and not till after this treatment has been undergone are the services of the elocutionist of the slightest avail. One case, that came under the author's notice, was that of a girl, who, on examination, was found to be suffering from a slight lateral curvature of the spine. In cases where nothing but mere nervousness is given, showing the part the mind plays, and the consequent importance of diverting the mind during the lessons in exercises adopted for the cure :—" He was a merry, cheefful little lad, very fond of games, and of playing at cards ; and, although he was one of the worst stammerers I have ever seen, he could chatter like a magpie when engaged in one of his favourite pastimes."
