that the constant praying aloud, counting of beads, and singing give these pilgrim trains a very curious aspect. They are called trains de plaisir, but their general aspect is very different from the ordinary excursion trains, in which the French indulge in exuberant laughter and banter.

I AM glad to see a tiny notice in the Woman's Herald re the great Nursing controversy. I have remarked, with surprise, that this so-called Liberal Paper for Women has, of late, studiously avoided any notice of Nursing politics—one of the greatest *women* questions of the day. The *Morning Leader* has, however, inspired a "par." "Nurse Sweating" has for two years been very much en évidence in the general press, and one cannot but deplore the fact, that the women's papers have shown themselves either singularly ignorant or totally callous concerning the terribly unjust conditions under which Nurses labour as a class. There are 20,000 women, at least, in the ranks of trained Nursing. Why should they not be inspired by gratitude to swell the ranks demanding the enfranchisement of their sex? But so long as political women only talk, and take no real interest in the different branches of women's labour, so long will the majority of women hold aloof, and fail to press their claims for Women's Suffrage.
