Matron's pretty sitting room, and in a few minutes Miss Allen, the Matron, came in, and greeted us with courtesy and kindness, devoting to us all the time at her disposal, whilst we patiently awaited the verdict.

After having made a tour round the Hospital, I could only come to one conclusion, namely, that the greatest order prevailed in every department, and that Miss Allen must be an admirable Matron whom it might be considered a privilege to follow.

With regard to the three years' system of training nurses there can be no question, and this rule ought to be strictly adhered to; but, at the same time, in some Hospitals, where the training is really thorough, the class of nurses very carefully selected, and the Matron a woman of discretion, who fully understands the sending of a nurse quite suited to the case, may it not be practicable to send nurses out to private families at the end of two years, with every confidence and good results.—I am, Sir, yours truly,

But it is not justifiable to make money by such dishonest methods —and now, that the important judgment of the Lords' Select Committee has been given upon the necessity of the three years' training, it is only a question of time when the public will decline to accept nurses who have had a shorter term of Hospital experience. If this three years' "rule ought to be strictly adhered to" in the training, we fail to grasp the justice of our correspondent's argu ment.—ED.]
