THE WORCESTER INFIRMARY.

IN another column, we reprint, from a leading provincial newspaper, the full report of a County Court action which will be of much interest, as it is undoubtedly of much importance, to Nurses—but which the constant pressure upon our space has prevented us from earlier noticing.

The facts of the case are extremely simple, and apparently are not in dispute. It is the conclusion to which the Judge arrived, and guided by which the Jury acted, and the revelations of the management of the Worcester Infirmary which were made, to which the chief interest will be attached.

It seems to be admitted, then, that Miss HARRIET BELSEY in August, 1891, bound herself to an Institution controlled by Miss BARNFATHER of Manchester, but the name of which is not mentioned, under the old fashioned arrangement which is being so rapidly discarded in all parts of the country that the days of its survival are probably numbered. We refer to the arrangement whereby women who desire to become Nurses bind themselves to serve a commercial Institution for a certain number of years.
