The Wife and Mother ; A Medical Guide to the care of the Health and the Management of her Children. By Albert Westland, M.D., etc. (Charles Griffin & Company, Ltd., Exeter Street, Strand.) Price Five Shillings. This book is addressed by the Author "to women who are desirous of fulfilling properly their duties as wives and mothers, and is designed to assist them in exercising an intelligent supervision over their own and their children's health," and thoroughly and completely has the talented and experienced author done his work, in language clear, distinct, and practical, so that any and everyone may find therein information of a most valuable kind. The book is divided into four parts, and in Part I. there are eight chapters dealing respectively with "Duties and Responsibilities of Married Life;" "Altered Conditions of Life after Marriage;" "Signs and Symptoms of Pregnancy;" "Management of Unpleasant Accompaniments of Pregnancy;" "Miscarriage, its Causes, Risks, Prevention and Management;" "Premature Confinement;" and "Preparations for Confinement." Confinement, and therefore the wide scope and real usefulness of the book can be appreciated. Part II.

treats of "Early Motherhood;" Part III. "The Child;" and Part IV. of "Later Married Life;" and the whole is crowned by a useful appendix giving the "Laws relating to Registration of Births, to Vaccination, and to Notification of Infectious Diseases in the United Kingdom." For a book which is so thorough and so carefully written, we have nothing but the highest possible praise. It is a most important work on a most important subject.

How to Feel the Pulse and what to Feel in it; Practical Hints for Beginners. By William Ewart, M.D., F.R.C.P. (Balliere, Tindall & Co., 20 King William Street, Strand, W.C.) Price 3s. 6d.—Dr. Ewart has, he states in this excellent work, "devoted his pen to matters which are scarcely touched upon in most books on the Pulse, but which are deemed of practical importance," and has treated them in an elementary fashion, having in view the fact that the book is chiefly required for students. How far Dr. Ewart has succeeded in his task is only to be gathered from a thorough perusal of the work the deductions and propositions in which will bear every investigation and test. It has a dozen admirable illustrations, and contains what we do not remember to have met with before—a "Glossary of Terms in use at the present time or in the past in connection with the Pulse," as well as a "Latin List" of Terms. The book is an exceedingly valuable and acceptable contribution to the literature on the subject.

Cardiac Outlines, for Clinical Clerks and Practitioners, and First Principles in the Physical Examination of the Heart, for the Beginner. Same author and publishers. (Price not given.)—This book is of equal merit with the above, and is distinguished by the like care and erudition bestowed upon it. Upwards of sixty capital illustrations and a supply of thoracic and cardiac outlines (4½ by 3¼ inches) on gummed paper are included in a convenient pocket. It is admirably calculated to fulfil the object for which it is written, and is deserving of the highest praise.

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
