Training of Limbless for Industry..

A series of lectures on the training of the limbless for industry were recently held in Scotland, under the auspices of the Medical Services Division of the Ministry of Pensions, and at the Edinburgh

Ministry of Pensions, and at the Edinburgh lecture Dr. R. Langdale Kelham, chief limb surgeon to the Ministry, pointed out that there was a national obligation towards men who had lost limbs in the service of their country. and suggested that his Ministry realised that obligation very fully.

Following upon the last war, the Ministry, he said, had up to 1921 fitted 45,000 with artificial limbs and since then 10,000 more had been fitted.

At the conclusion of the lecture a numebr of men andwomen who were in all cases local residents, gave striking demonstrations of their capacity to stand up to normal conditions with the same confidence as their more fortunatecomrades.
