It was agreed that the Revenue Account and Balance Sheet as submitted be adopted.

Registration.

The Council agreed to accept for registration by reciprocity nurses trained for a period of not less than three years, under special conditions, in the Province of Quebec.

Applications for approval for registration were:— General Register, by Examination 45, by reciprocity, 3; Supplementary Part of the Register for Sick Children's Nurses, by Examination, 2; for Fever Nurses, by Examination, 20. Total 70.

It was agreed that 107 nurses who had hitherto failed to pay their retention fee, and now wished their names re-included in the Register, should be re-included.

The list of names of 3,411 nurses who have not paid their Retention Fee for 1942 was considered, and it was agreed that these names be removed from the Register in accordance with the Rules, Part II, Rule 5 (3).

Miss Helen Dey asked if names of nurses with the Services were amongst the names for removal from the Register. The Registrar replied that cases of non-payment of the fee by those nurses received due consideration.
