## NURSES' CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT.

The News Letter of the Nurses Christian Movement is always of an elevating nature, and July 1945 gives the

following inspiring advice:

"The bells of victory have sounded in our ears, and the horrible nightmare of slavery, and concentration camps in Europe is coming to an end; though how long it will take Europe to recover from the disease and degradation left behind we dare not think. In Britain we are thanking God for a great deliverance, remembering as we do so those who have given their lives that we might live, and others who have lost those who were dearer than life. Nor do we forget some belonging to us who are still serving in the Far East, and we shall continue to pray for them. It is clear already that the end of the war in Europe does not mean the end of our troubles. The only hope for the future of mankind is the Christian Gospel, and those of us who call ourselves Christians have need to do some clear thinking and wise planning. Let us not sit down and complain that we have been born into such a world, but go on our knees and thank God that He has "matched us with His hour. . . . . .

DEAR MADAM,—Your letter in regard to the regulations proposed by the Minister of Health which would lead to the recognition of the title of "Christian Science Nurse' was considered sympathetically at the Standing Joint Committee of the three Royal Medical Colleges. They found it impossible to intervene effectively in the matter, but were very anxious to support the British College of Nurses in all matters in which the freedom of the profession seemed to be endangered. They were of opinion that it would be advisable to maintain closer and more regular contact between the representatives of the Nursing Profession and the Royal Medical Colleges when by united action undesirable developments might be effectively opposed.—Yours sincerely, ALFRED WEBB-JOHNSON, President.

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
