THE SOCIETY OF MENTAL NURSES.

A new Society of Mental Nurses has been organised : the Society of Mental Nurses.

Miss O. F. Griffith, S.R.N., R.M.N., D.N., S.C.M., Assistant Matron, Mill Hill Hospital, N.W.7, is the Hon. Secretary of the organisation, and writes calling our attention to the aims of the new society, which has now prepared and passed its regulations.

"The Society," she states, " was formed only after much preliminary inquiry to see if any existing body could supply the great need for educational and professional work among trained and student mental nurses. The Mental Hospital Nurses' League formed for the same purpose had become inactive and found it impossible to revive. A meeting was then held to see whether support would be forthcoming and those present decided to form a society. We look forward to close co-operation with all other organisations which have the good of nurses at heart."

Membership.

All nurses who hold the Final Certificate of either the General Nursing Council or the Royal Medico-Psychological Association in Mental Nursing or Mental Deficiency Nursing are eligible for membership. The Central Executive Committee may admit to membership persons with excep-tional qualifications or experience if they think fit. The fee for membership is ± 1 1s. per annum.

Objects.

The objects of the Society are admirable and aim at promoting the well-being of Mental Nurses in every particular. An excellently constructed Circular of Rules, Regulations, etc., has been compiled.

HIGH TIME THE CIVIL NURSING RESERVE CLOSED DOWN.

DEAR MADAM,-I would be most grateful to you, if you would kindly publish this letter, so that Matrons of Hospitals and Sanatoria might be tempted to give their views on whether or not they think that it is now high time for the Civil Nursing Reserve to close down.

As you are aware, the Reserve was quite definitely a war time appendage of the Nursing Profession. It came into being so that married nurses-who had already left the profession-might return in emergency and help out in the hospitals. Also, it enabled office girls to help out in institutions after office hours, especially after big air raids. Civil Nursing Reserve members manned First Aid Posts (now no longer necessary) ; and it ought not to be forgotten
