#### BIRTH-RATE FALLS-BUT FEWER BABIES DIE.

During the June quarter of last year the birth-rate for England and Wales showed a decline compared with the same period in 1944. But infant deaths were fewer than the average of the 10 preceding quarters.

The Registrar-General's Return of Births, Deaths and Marriages registered in the quarter ended June 30th, which was issued recently, records a birth-rate of 16.6 per thousand of the population compared with 18.9 in last year's second quarter. In the five years prior to 1944 the average rate for this period was 15.9.

There were 175,319 births registered. Of these, 90,609 were boys, giving a proportion of 1,070 boys to 1,000 girls. The average for the 10 preceding second quarters was 1,056.

Infant mortality remained at a very low level. A provisional rate of 41 per 1,000 related live births was 11 below the average for the 10 preceding second quarters and was the lowest rate for any June quarter. There were 7,201 deaths of babies under one year old.

A general death-rate of 10.5 per thousand compared with 10.9 for the June quarter of 1944. In the previous five years the average for the same part of the year was 11.7. Births registered exceeded deaths by 64,185; the corresponding increases in the second quarters of 1942, 1943 and 1944 were 50,674, 67,797 and 83,491 respectively.

A total of 99,241 marriages exceeded by 1,726 the figure for the corresponding period last year, but was lower by 2,491 than the average for the second quarters of the five years before 1944.
