MINISTRY OF HEALTH TRAINING GRANTS FOR MIDWIFE TEACHERS.

To help in the training of midwives the Minister of Health, Mr. Aneurin Bevan, announces that Government Scholarships are to be granted next year to assist midwives with the necessary qualifications to take a whole-time course of preparation for the Midwife Teachers' Diploma.

The scholarships consist of an allowance of ± 65 towards fees, maintenance and expenses, payable throughout training.

Mr. Bevan is asking employing authorities to tell midwives in their service about the scheme.

Scholarship candidates must comply with requirements of the Central Midwives Board and must not be in receipt of other financial assistance. They will be required to undertake to give at least 2 years' service in Great Britain in the instruction of pupil midwives after qualification.

The Royal College of Midwives intend to run a four months' non-residential course in London beginning early next year, and while this will not be limited to scholarship holders, up to 15 scholarships may be awarded for it.

Applications for admission to this course must be made before October 11th.

Application forms for admission to the Royal College course and for the award of a scholarship may be obtained from either the Central Midwives Board, 73, Great Peter Street, London, S.W.1, or the Royal College of Midwives, 57, Lower Belgrave Street, London, S.W.1, or the Ministry of Health, Whitehall, London, S.W.1. NEARLY 13,000 MIDWIVES SEND VIEWS TO WORKING PARTY.

Replies awaited from 7,000 more

Nearly 13,000 midwives out of the 20,000 who received questionnaires from the Midwifery Working Party in August have so far replied. But the Working Party is now appealing to the remainder to answer before the end of the month.

Midwives, whether still practising or not, are being asked to give facts and views for the guidance of the Working Party who, at the request of the Minister of Health and the Secretary of State for Scotland, are inquiring into the recruiting, training and present shortage of midwives. Frank replies are being sought. Midwives are asked to give reasons for any dissatisfaction they may feel and any difficulties they are meeting. They are also asked to state if they are practising in town or country; in hospital or in the homes of the mothers.

Two sets of questionnaires were sent out: 17,500 went to midwives who notified their intention to practise in 1944, with a follow-up reminder; and 11,887 (68 per cent.) have replied. Another 2,880 went to midwives who qualified in 1946, with no reminder; 1,031 have replied (35.6 per cent.). In an appeal sent to all those in both groups who have not yet answered, the Working Party emphasise that they need the help even of those midwives who are no longer practising.

It is important to get all replies in before the end of this month so that the big task of analysing them can begin. All the answers will be tabulated on machines so that there is complete anonymity.
