themselves. We have allowed our unity to be destroyed, and internal friction and jealousies and lust for power

have rent our seamless garment.

It is not too late to remedy this bad state of affairs. We must strengthen our unity and present a loyal and defiant front in the face of attack. We must define a strong and independent policy and determine that, whatever the cost, we shall retain our privileges and positions. Our New Year resolution must be that we shall glorify and strengthen the status of Registered Nurses, so that eager young women, who are attracted to the Profession of Nursing, will find a worthwhile field of Service to their fellow-men, and will bless those who carved out such a noble career for them. May the choicest of all good things attend the way of Registered Nurses throughout this year of Grace, 1947.
