have commented unfavourably on the answers. Some complain that the candidates did not recognise the condition as an emergency, and comment on the omission of preparation for an anæsthetic. On the other hand, one examiner comments on too drastic preparation, showing little appreciation of the pain and shock the patient would have.

Question 3—Nasal Feed.—Lack of detail noted and comment made that few seem to have had any practical experience of the administration. Some candidates stated that one ounce of sterile water would be poured into the

tube to see if it was in the right place.

Question 6—Head Injury.—Many made no mention of special observations that should be made. Many "put their patients to bed, packed up with hot-water bottles; blood and plasma transfusions were given and other treat-

ments liable to raise blood pressure; and the patient got masal feeds—all within the first 24 hours."

On the other hand, many examiners have commented favourably on the answers as a whole.

One, however, quotes one candidate who thinks that the "doctor may order Paraldehyde 4 to 6 ozs."

Question 8—Tepid Sponging.—Nearly every examiner comments unfavourably on the answers received. Lack of detail was noted in some cases and procedure was confused with blanket bathing.

FINAL FEVER EXAMINATION.

The general impression received was that, although the standard of education, as shown by grammar, spelling, etc., was low, the students were well instructed in the principles of fevers and fever nursing, although lack of personal experience with many diseases led to quite important blunders.

It appears to us that this report on Written Examinations is a most useful precedent to those responsible for the training of nurses from every point of view, concerning both theoretical and practical teaching.

The responsibility of training is realised in connection with present conditions and the youthfulness of the

entrants.
