"Culinary Campaign."

A MOST interesting and amusing book has been presented to the library. It is an old publication dated 1857 and called "Culinary Campaign." It is an almost unique account of his adventures in the Crimean Peninsula during the Crimean War by a Monsieur A. Soyer. At one time chef of the Reform Club, famous in Victorian London, this professional chef offered his services to the military authorities and the Government to go out to the Crimea to improve the cooking arrangements in camps and hospitals. He went, and this Book is his own account of what he did out there. His accounts are very graphic and the flashes of French wit with which the book is scattered make it pleasant reading.

The book holds special interest for nurses because of the many references to Miss F. Nightingale. M. Soyer worked with her a great deal and had a great admiration for her and her work.

The book makes lively reading and is interesting for the account of the Crimean War from the pen of a noncombatant who could and did travel all over the battlefields as well as behind the lines.
