Commissions for Nurses in Q.A.R.A.N.C.

(Queen Alexandra's Royal Army Nursing Corps) .

Service in the Q.A.R.A.N.C. opens up an attractive career to accepted applicants for commissions in the British Army. They must be British subjects of British parentage, medically fit, and on the General Register of the General Nursing Council. There are also vacancies for State Registered Nurses with special qualifications, e.g., S.C.M., T.A., R.M.N.

SHORT SERVICE COMMISSIONS

Under a new short service commission scheme candidates may choose to serve for a period of 2, 3 or 4 years. After the satisfactory completion of this period, a gratuity is granted at the rate of £50 for each full year of service. During this time the candidate may be considered for regular commissions.

Applications can be made from civilian sources or by officers who have been released. Applicants must be single, or widows without dependents, age 35 or under. Consideration is given in special cases up to the age of 40 years. Selected applicants are commissioned in the rank of subaltern (sister) and are eligib e for promotion.

Training

Training courses are available in many branches of nursing to qualify for civil and military certificates.

Free accommodation, rations and all military amenities are provided.
