The Best Branch of the Profession.

NOWN in Cape Town there is a young South African woman who has what must be one of the busiest

She is the sister-in-charge of the nursery of a maternity

home into which come every month some four score little citizens and "citizenesses" of the future.
"When I began my training," she said recently, "I wanted to specialise in child nursing, and after 17 months of this work I still feel that it is the best branch of the profession. It gives one a great sense of satisfaction, particularly when it involves caring for premature babies, or those who are ill. But if one has no love of them or if one is not in a good state of health, they would soon get on one's nerves.'

Her nursery consists of a couple of airy rooms, each with 20 pretty pink-and-white cribs. Its day begins at six in the morning, for the youngsters require a lot of attention. It takes four of her assistants 2½ hours to bath them. Then there are the feeds, supplementary bottles of glucose and water have to be prepared, and there is the incessant changing of napkins. In the course of a day there are about 250 changes, by the two nurses on duty in one section. Tears and the sound of 40 crying babes are taken as a matter of course by the sister-in-charge and her staff, consisting of a junior sister and 10 other young women. "Surprising as it may seem," avers the sister-in-charge, "one gets used to it." Even in their first 10 days, she explained with amusement, some of the babies contrive to establish themselves as nursery favourites, and they are all called by their name.
