The Council was therefore pleased to receive appreciative letters in reply, accepting the hospitality which has been arranged for some six of our colleagues. In connection with a considerable amount of correspondence a letter was reported from Mrs. M. Shaw, S.R.N., S.C.M., a Member of the Executive Committee and Hon. Treasurer of Twickenham Women's Organisations Festival Exhibition on "Women of the Century," to be held June 25th-30th, stating that as there would be a section devoted to the History of Nursing, she had been advised to approach the British College of Nurses, Ltd.
